


Physical ... Education ...





CULLMAN HIGH SCHOOL: THEN AND NOW

Cullman High School first served the students of Cullman and Cullman County as a County High School. Later it was sold to the City of Cullman to be used as a city school. The New Cullman Senior High School, built in 1959 to relieve the crowded conditions of the old school, might truly be known as a "School of the Space Age". Consisting of ten modern buildings spread over 18 acres, the school is one of the newest and most modern in the State. To aid in helping students reach their highest potential, classes in English,

science, and mathematics have been divided into advanced, regular, and functional. For commercially interested students there are studies in typing, shorthand, bookkeeping vocational education and diversified occupations. Students interested in foreign languages may take Latin, French, German, and Spanish. With something for everyone, Cullman High School diligently strives to maintain a high rating as a leader in the space age.





Science "Zooms" students into the space age

Assistant Principal Charles McNutt teaches chemistry and physics. Mr. McNutt holds B.S. and M.Ed. degrees from Auburn.






Students interested in becoming engineers, scientists, secretaries and businessmen find Geometry, Algebra I and II, trigonometry, general and business math essential parts of their schedule.






On-the-job training is given to students seeking to be mechanics, beauticians, practical nurses, dental assistants, and radio and T.V. repairmen.
























